

## Index

This index covers topics, codewords, organizations, and the 200 persons most intimately involved in the planning or forecasting of BARBAROSSA, including all such persons mentioned at more than one place in the text. Other persons connected with BARBAROSSA are identified in Appendix A, Appendix B, and the Bibliography.

Except for occasional special cases, the index omits all persons mentioned only once, any persons mentioned only in connection with codebreaking or intelligence but not directly linked to BARBAROSSA, and all historians of BARBAROSSA. The historians are cited in Table 7.1 and in the Bibliography.
