The Editors

The editors of this book have written chapter 1 and the introductory text appearing at the beginnings of chapters 2 through 8.

Earl W. Foell is editor-in-chief of *The Christian Science Monitor*. A native of Houston, he graduated with honors in mathematics from Principia College in Elsah, Illinois. Except for a few years with the *Los Angeles Times*, Mr. Foell has spent his entire working career with the *Monitor*, serving as managing editor and editor before being named editor-in-chief in 1983. He was for many years the paper's UN correspondent. Mr. Foell has been president of the UN Press Corps and is currently on the board of the World Peace Foundation and the Japan Society. He is chairman of the Third World Journalism Exchange Program of the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

Richard A. Nenneman is managing editor of *The Christian Science Monitor*. He graduated magna cum laude from Harvard College and later received an M.A. degree in International Studies from Harvard. He served with the US Army Counter Intelligence Corps in Germany for two years. Following a brief career in banking, he became the *Monitor's* business and financial editor. After serving nine years in that position, he rejoined the banking com-

munity and became the chief investment officer at the Girard Bank in Philadelphia. He returned to the *Monitor* in 1983.

Both Messrs. Foell and Nenneman wrote chapters in the book *Understanding Our Century*, published to commemorate the 75th anniversary of *The Christian Science Monitor* in 1983.

The final chapter of this book was written by Lincoln Bloomfield, who is a professor of political science at MIT. Professor Bloomfield received the S.B., M.P.A., and Ph.D. degrees in political science from Harvard and was the recipient of the Harvard Chase prize in 1956, as well as a Littauer fellow (1952) and Rockefeller fellow (1954, 1975). Professor Bloomfield served as director of global issues in the National Security Council during the Carter administration. The author of several books, the professor has also written numerous articles, that have appeared in such publications as *Newsweek* and *Foreign Affairs*. Professor Bloomfield is also a trustee of the World Peace Foundation.
