This book is about IT design. IT design is carried out as a project in a company to design sustainable IT usage. The project produces a decision-making foundation for the company regarding potentials and opportunities for implementing IT usage that answer the problems and challenges that the company is facing.

The book is the result of a ten-year research collaboration between the authors and Danish and American companies to develop and test a method for IT design. We made it a goal to explore whether it was possible to set sensible, general, and, not least, workable guidelines for IT design projects.
